Galatians 1:11-2:10 Bible Study

Launch: What kinds of attacks on Christianity do you hear of these days?

1. **Read Galatians 1:11—2:10.** Where did Paul get his Gospel from?

v. 11 a revelation from Jesus (not taught it from other men)

2. Look at Paul's two visits to Jerusalem and answer:

First Visit (1:18-24)

When did he go? After 3 years

Why did he go? To get acquainted with Cephas (=Peter)

Who did he see? Cephas and James (no other apostles)

Second Visit (2:1-10)

When did he go? After 14 years (probably 14 years after his conversion, but could have been 14 years after his first visit.

Why did he go? In response to a revelation; to be present 'his' gospel; to make sure he had not run his race in vein.

Who did he see? 'those esteemed as leaders' (v6); 'those held in high esteem' (v6), James, Cephas, John (v9); it seems that all these references are at least to these three, although could be referring to a larger group of apostles.

3. What was the result of Paul's second visit to Jerusalem (when he met with the other apostles)?

Titus wasn't required to be circumcised (2:3) - this raises a specific issue which will be the topic of next week's sermon...

The added nothing to Paul's message (2:6) - he had the complete Gospel

The recognised God was at work in Paul as an apostle (2:8)

The extended the right hand of fellowship (2:9)

4. Why do you think Paul outlines all of this historical detail of times and places and events?

It seems Paul is defending himself (and his ministry) against some false accusations – and accusations primarily aimed at him personally. (c.f. 2:4)

The main issue at stake is where Paul received his Gospel from (1:11-12). Some must be saying he was dependent on the apostles in Jerusalem, and that his message was dependent on them. Paul argues otherwise: he received the Gospel from Jesus – and he taught for 14 years before he met with the apostles.

- 5. How does Paul's listing of these historical events affect our attitude toward Paul and his writings?
- 6. **Read 1:13-16 again**. Notice the contrast between the 'I' of verses 13-14 and 'God' in verses 15-16. What did God do to make Paul an apostle?
- 7. If you were criticised for not believing the authentic Gospel of God's free grace (even though you did), how would you defend yourself?
- 8. How can we make sure the true Gospel is being preached in our churches?
- 9. Finish by praying:
 - a. Being thankful for God's revelation to Paul (and us)
 - b. Thanking God for his grace, as demonstrated to Paul
 - c. Asking that we will hold to the true Gospel of grace
 - d. Other things that have come up
