THE NATURE OF SALVATION

John 1:12

Introduction: The word "salvation" is used often in the Bible and by Christians, especially pastors. Just what does the word involve? What does the word mean?\

- "Salvation" is a definite act.
- "Salvation" is a process.
- "Salvation" has yet to be completed.

I. SALVATION IS DELIVERANCE FROM SIN (John 1:12)

("To save" from any kind of danger or peril)

- 1. The Old Testament view of God's favor was one's material and physical welfare, such as sickness, male children, their enemies, etc.
- 2. The New Testament view changed to spiritual and eternal aspects:
 - The central theme of being "saved" is spending eternity with Jesus Christ, not being materially blessed.
- 3. New Testament salvation is being saved from sin's hold while Old Testament salvation was being saved from evil and enemies.
- 4. New Testament salvation comes by God's grace, while Old Testament salvation came by works under the Law.
- 5. Salvation from sin can come only when a greater power than sin comes into and controls that life.
 - Thus Jesus Christ saves and the Holy Spirit indwells to insure continued control.

II. SALVATION IS BECOMING LIKE JESUS CHRIST (1 John 3:2)

- 1. *Romans* 8:28-29 God's will is that the believer become like Jesus Christ.
 - One way of being like Jesus (the first step) is to be free of sin.
- 2. Jesus Christ is the believer's example. We are to copy Him.
 - The greatest criticism of Christians by non-believers is that Christians don't act like Jesus.
- 3. To be saved is to be on the road of becoming more like Jesus Christ each day.
- 4. *Mark 9:43-47* Being saved is entering the kingdom of God.
- 5. Being made "whole" is to be made complete, whether physical, mental, or spiritual through Jesus Christ.

III. SALVATION WILL GIVE THE BELIEVER A NEW HOME (2 Timothy 4:18; John 14)

- 1. The believer is already on his/her way to a new habitation.
- 2. God is creating a new heaven and earth for all believers.
- 3. Remember the story Jesus told of the rich man and the beggar, Lazarus?
- 4. The indwelling Holy Spirit causes the believers to look forward to his/her final home.
- 5. Even this world awaits the new world to come. (*Romans 8:18*)

CONCLUSION:

- 1. "Salvation" is something we cannot earn nor deserve.
- 2. "Salvation" is freely given to everyone who places his/her sincere trust and belief in God's Son, Jesus Christ.
- 3. "Salvation" is permanent and is made so, not by the believer's efforts, but by the work of the Holy Spirit, who indwells each believer permanently.
- 4. "Salvation" is an expression of God's love to us and can never be taken away.
